


FROM THE BOARD COLLECTIVE

How sexual assault survivors respond to trauma and why the Ghomeshi evidence isn't surprising

Why hang out with someone who just slapped and choked you?

That's the question Jian Ghomeshi's defense attorney Marie Henein seems to be asking not only complainant Lucy DeCoutere, but everyone watching the high-profile sexual assault trial unfold.

Last week in a Toronto courtroom, Henein picked apart the Trailer Park Boys actor's testimony, as she did with the first complainant (who cannot be named due to a publication ban). Both women faced scrutiny over inconsistencies in their testimony — from what

Beyond inconsistencies, Henein zeroed-in on the conduct of both women. Unearthing e-mails, photos and handwritten letters, Henein put every bit of contact the complainants had with Ghomeshi after the alleged assaults on display.

kind of car the disgraced CBC star drove, to whether he paused momentarily between blows when assaulting them.

First it was a bikini photo emailed to Ghomeshi by the first complainant. Then photos of DeCoutere and Ghomeshi cuddling hours after she alleges he slapped and choked her at his Toronto home in 2003. Finally, Henein presented a series of messages DeCoutere sent to Ghomeshi, including an e-mail the day after the alleged assault in which DeCoutere wrote: "You kicked my ass last night and that that me want to f-k your brains out."
